Upcoming Board of Recreation activities are as follows:

**Archery Clinic** - Open to those 6 years old and up. The spring session will run from April 9 - June 25, 2022, on Saturday mornings in three sessions: 9:00 - 9:45 10:00 - 10:45 11:00 - 11:45. Registration fee is \$25.00. Bring your registration form (download) and fee to the first session. Held behind the DPW at 24 Industrial Avenue. There will be no archery on April 16 because everyone will be at the Easter Egg Hunt. There will also be no archery on May 28 for Memorial Day weekend.

**Easter Egg Hunt** - The Easter Egg Hunt is scheduled for Saturday, April 16, 2022, at 10:00 a.m. SHARP at Veteran's Park. Line up at 9:45 a.m. on the Preston Street side of the high school. Prizes will be awarded and the Easter Bunny will be on hand to greet the children. All children up to Grade 6 are invited to participate. The Easter Egg Hunt is a rain or shine (or snow!) event. Don't forget a basket to carry your eggs! Please remember this is a dog-free park and dogs are not permitted to enter the park.

**Adult Women's Slow-Pitch Softball** - Completed registration packets are due by March 31. The season begins in May and runs through July. All women 18 years of age and older (including out-of-towners) are eligible to play in this league. Late registrations should be immediately dropped off at the Village Clerk's Office. Registration fee is \$900.00 per team.

**Tennis** - Registration forms are online. The program is available for RP residents/students or those attending school in RP. Barry Ruback runs this program, which is taught by All Pro Tennis Staff. Saturdays, May 7, 14, 21, 28, June 4. Cost is \$85.00.

## RIDGEFIELD PARK PREPARES FOR NJ PLASTIC POLLUTION REDUCTION ACT

New law bans plastic and paper bags, foam and limits straws

Ridgefield Park prepares for the implementation of the NJ's Plastic Pollution Reduction Act, which was signed into law by Governor Murphy in November 2020. The state acted after more than 130 municipal ordinances were passed tackling disposable, single-use plastics.

Through the law, single-use plastic bags, as well as disposable food containers and cups made out of polystyrene foam, will be banned beginning in May 2022. Paper bags will also be banned in supermarkets over 2,500 square feet. Restaurants and food service businesses will be allowed to provide single-use plastic straws only upon request starting November 2021.

The Plastic Pollution Reduction Act represents a comprehensive plastic policy and is a major step to reducing litter that threatens vulnerable wildlife. When fish and other wildlife mistake plastic for food, intestinal blockage and death can result. What's more is that the chemicals used to manufacture plastic transfers to fish tissue, and eventually enter the human food chain.

New Jerseyans use 4.4 billion single-use plastic and 1,300 football fields of trees worth of paper bags every year. The law will reduce the use of these products and in turn protect the state's 130-mile coast line and open spaces. This may all seem to be a real hassle and headache. But, that is what some people said when we started recycling. We urge all residents of Ridgefield Park to start preparing for the change now with simple swaps. In the long run, we will have a cleaner and less polluted home.

Tips to break the plastic habit:

### Straws:

- If dining out, simply tell your server "no straw, please" when you order your drink. When the law takes effect, you'll be used to your drink, sans straw! Expanded Polystyrene Foam (commonly known as Styrofoam):
- Bring your own clean takeout containers with you, preferably glass
- Bring your own reusable thermos or water bottle with you

### Bags:

- Use what you have. If you've already got a closet full of bags, try them out. That may be all you need.
  - Think inside the box. Consider reusing cardboard boxes or a crate to carry your groceries.
  - Pick a durable bag. If you are in the market for a new reusable bag, keep in mind that they typically need to be used hundreds or thousands of times to offset the carbon footprint from their manufacture.
  - Find a bag you love. There are many different styles out there, so be sure to prioritize a bag you'll be proud to carry with you.
  - Consider your lifestyle. Need one that fits in a pocket or in your trunk? Lugging your groceries home by foot or loading them into your car? Pick a bag that will serve your needs.
  - Go recycled. Bags made from recycled plastic typically have a low carbon footprint; however, pollution is still a concern with any plastic product.
  - Understand cotton. Canvas is a delightful natural product, but since cotton has a high carbon footprint, look for bags made from recycled material (eg, old jeans).
  - Bring it with you. While this might seem obvious, for many of us, it's not easy. Be sure to try out different strategies until you find a habit that sticks.

## CELEBRATE THE TREES!

Join the celebration! It's time again for the annual Arbor Day festivities which this year will be held at the Ridgefield Park Public Library, 107 Cedar Street, on Saturday, April 30, 2022. Library personnel and Shade Tree commission members together are planning the program. As usual it will include Village children who this year will receive white dogwood saplings to take home and plant, with accompanying instructions for care. The program time will be posted on the Village website and the digital bulletin board outside Town Hall. In 1872, the nation's first tree planting holiday was celebrated and then a century later the Arbor Day Foundation was launched. So this is a special year!!! This is the 150th anniversary for Arbor Day, the 50th anniversary for the Arbor Day Foundation and the 43 year for the Village's Arbor Day celebration. All states have Arbor Days and the mission for all is the same: "inspire people to plant, nurture, and celebrate trees."

Good news for trees, and consequently for all humans and living creatures, in this celebratory year! Globally in the past four years, over a million trees have been planted by nearly 12 million volunteers. The effort was launched by the Arbor Day Foundation with funding from 18 corporations such as Bank of America, FedEx, Target, and Verizon.

Fortunately in Ridgefield Park, there are many people inspired to help! Town officials, residents, and the DPW combine efforts to plant trees as well as to care for existing trees. The Shade Tree Commission, which was established in 1979, to plant and care for the "shade trees, and shrubbery upon and in the streets, highways, public places, parks, and parkways," encourages residents to join. There's always rewarding work to be done; STC meetings are the fourth Monday of each month, except in December the second Monday, at 7:30 pm in the 3rd floor conference room in Town Hall.



Spring 2022 planting plans are underway, but there is still time to contact the STC to request a tree for this year; email [shadetreecomm@ridgefieldpark.org](mailto:shadetreecomm@ridgefieldpark.org) with your name, address, and phone number or email. Any tree that was removed by STC will be replaced. Currently, there's a nursery order list of approximately 60 beautiful trees including; dogwoods, red buds, maples, elms, zelkovas, oaks, and Yoshino cherries.

### Sewer Lines

Tree roots do not crack sewer lines, but if old clay sewer lines crack, tree roots might invade the line.

Any questions about a sewer should be addressed to a professional such as a plumber. Here are some suggested approaches from experts, but always follow manufacturer's directions: Robic foaming root killer (Root X is one brand) or copper sulfate; both of which have to be used regularly and work best when roots haven't clogged the lines. The Robic foaming root killer claims to kill roots that may be in upper and lower portions of the sewer lines due to its foaming action. Copper sulfate claims to kill roots growing along the bottom of sewer lines. These are said to be essentially preventive treatments.

Once the lines are clogged by roots, experts say the lines might need to be snaked with a root cutting head.

### Featured Tree Species

Since the Library and STC will distribute white dogwood saplings to the children at the Arbor Day Celebration that species is highlighted in this issue. Dogwood trees are widely appreciated for their delicate beauty and the white dogwood, *Cornus florida* L., is no exception. It is a small to medium sized tree with large white blossoms in the spring followed by red fruits that with small twigs are important foods for numerous song and game birds, rabbits, and squirrels. In autumn, the leaves are a spectacular show of scarlet, orange, or purple.

HAPPY SPRING and enjoy the beautiful trees along the Village streets, yards and parks.

## COMING SOON! RIDGEFIELD PARK'S OWN NATURE PRESERVE!

Construction on the Ridgefield Park Nature Preserve is nearing completion and, If all work goes as planned, it will be ready for opening ceremonies by late spring or early summer!! This was partially made possible through a \$299,000 grant that the Village received from The Bergen County Open Space Trust Fund for the purpose of preserving open space.

The Nature Preserve is, approximately, 13 acres of woodlands, open fields and wetlands that supports a variety of plant and animal life. It will feature an interpretive nature trail through these various habitats so that visitors can experience and learn about the natural world that thrives there. The trail will include educational exhibit panels that will describe the natural history of the Preserve and a floating boardwalk made from recycled plastic that will allow for accessing the Preserve's open wetlands. A large section of the trail and boardwalk will be handicapped accessible and allow for wheelchair access.

Along with providing Village residents with the opportunity to simply go for a pleasant stroll in nature, The Nature Preserve will provide many opportunities for all of us to learn more about our environment here in Ridgefield Park. Watch for future announcements of programs and events to be held at the Nature Preserve such as opportunities for bird watching, tree and wildflower identification walks, and hikes to study the Preserve's wildlife and habitats! Our Village schools and scouting groups can also look forward to utilizing the Nature Preserve for conducting environmental studies and outdoor science club activities!

### RAFFLES

All Clubs, Organizations, PTAs or Individuals that conduct 50/50's, tricky trays, basket raffles, bingo, casino nights, or any other type of raffle must register with the State of New Jersey Legalized Games of Chance Commission to obtain an Identification Number. Only after obtaining this ID number can you apply for a raffle license. The State will not issue a raffle license unless you are a registered organization. To register: [www.njconsumeraffairs.gov/lgcc](http://www.njconsumeraffairs.gov/lgcc) Failure to comply can result in your event being shut down.

Raffle license applications are available in the Village Clerk's office. Applications must be completed six (6) weeks prior to your raffle.

### Fundraising Update

Please be reminded that the PBA Local 86 is the only organization connected to our department. We absolutely do not solicit donations by telephone under any circumstances. Any requests for donations from any other police organizations should be carefully scrutinized. Please contact police headquarters at (201) 641-6400 if you have any questions or uncertainties.

### Fraud Alerts

Tax season is upon us and many Village residents have received fraudulent phone calls from the Internal Revenue Service. We would like to remind residents to be cautious when dealing with individuals soliciting private information via the telephone or internet. If you are unsure if the call is legitimate, ask for a contact name and information and inform the caller that you will be in touch with them at a later date and time. Please do not hesitate to contact the police department at any time, regarding any matter where you require assistance.

### Resident Vehicle Awareness

We would like to ask all of our Village residents to please be vigilant and alert for suspicious behavior during the late night hours. If you happen to be awake or are woken up from your sleep and witness suspicious behavior, please call Police Headquarters. There has been an uptick in catalytic converter thefts throughout the county as of late. Normally the subject(s) will either crawl under a vehicle or use a jack to lift the vehicle before using a sawzall to remove the catalytic converter. These sawzalls are fairly loud, but are only operated for a few seconds. We ask that you contact Police Headquarters immediately if you hear power tools being operated during the late hours of the night. The subject(s) can arrive, remove the catalytic converter and leave the area within a matter of minutes so a fast response is crucial.

We would also like to remind residents to remove key fobs from their vehicles and always lock their vehicle doors. A great deal of vehicle thefts have involved vehicles which have had key fobs left inside. Similarly, a great deal of vehicle burglaries have involved vehicles which had been left unlocked. These crimes often occur, but not exclusively, overnight. Please remain vigilant and report any suspicious behavior.

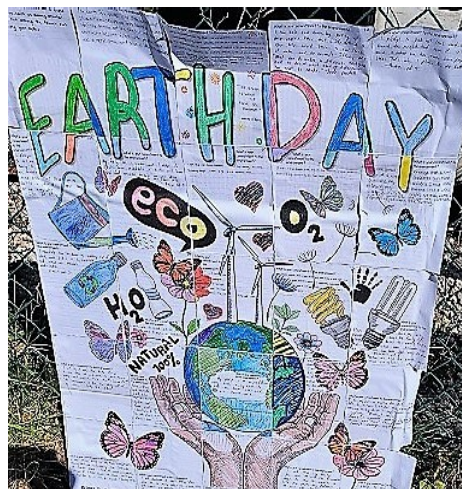

## VILLAGE OF RIDGEFIELD PARK BUREAU OF FIRE PREVENTION

Dear Resident,  
The Ridgefield Park Fire Prevention Bureau would like to remind you of the importance of maintaining working smoke detectors throughout your home or apartment. Smoke detectors are vital in alerting you and your family early should a fire occur in your home. Sadly, an average of 3 out of every 5 fire deaths in the United States occurs in homes without working smoke detectors.

Effective 2019, the NJ Uniform Fire Code requires that all battery-operated smoke detectors be sealed 10-year units, once these units are installed, they are maintenance free for up to 10 years with no need to worry about replacing batteries. Smoke detectors should be placed on the ceiling within 10 feet of all bedrooms and for added safety if possible should be placed in each bedroom. Detectors should also be placed on each level of your home, and also one at the top of each staircase. All smoke detectors have a lifespan of 10 years and any detectors more than 10 years old should be replaced as soon as possible, especially if they are the replaceable battery type. If you have older detectors (less than 10 years old) with replaceable batteries and cannot replace the detectors with newer sealed units, be sure to ensure the batteries are within 6 months old and never remove the batteries or the detectors due to nuisance alarms, i.e. cooking or smoking. If due to financial reasons you cannot afford to purchase smoke detectors for your home, the Ridgefield Park Fire Prevention Bureau in cooperation with the NJ State Division of Fire has smoke detectors available for residents free of charge, detectors are available at our office M-F 9am-3pm. Please keep in mind that if you live in a rental property it is the responsibility of the landlord to maintain your smoke detectors and if you feel that your landlord is not, or there is a problem with your smoke detectors and/or alarm system, contact the office and an inspector will check/investigate the problem and make the proper notifications to the landlord or building owner.

Finally, remember to test your smoke detectors once a month and if a detector starts chirping indicating a low battery, it is imperative that you replace the battery immediately, however it is preferred that you replace the detector. This is also a good time to discuss with your family an evacuation plan should a smoke detector sound in your home or you discover a fire. Your evacuation plan should ensure that all members of the home, especially your children know the importance of leaving the home immediately, having a meeting place somewhere safe away from the home or building and by no means should anyone ever attempt to re-enter the building for an item, toy or pet.

## WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE REASSESSMENT FOR 2022

As you know, the Village conducts an annual reassessment of our property values. Each year, assessments will reflect the current year's real estate market's estimate. During the past year, real estate values have increased - especially for residential properties. So, naturally those increased values are reflected in the assessed value of your homes.

Remember that although the new valuation of your home will be up, the tax rate will come down accordingly. In theory, if all other things remain equal, then your real estate tax bill should remain the same. BUT, if residential values increase more than the values of commercial properties, then there may be a shift in the tax burden from commercial properties to residential properties; or if the budgets for the Village, School District, or the County increase, then your taxes will naturally increase. We don't like having to raise taxes; but, that's the law.

Why do we do a REASSESSMENT every year?

The purpose of the reassessment is two-fold:

1. Keep assessments current, thereby receiving a 100% tax ratio from the state, and alleviating potential refunds on tax appeals.
2. Stabilizing the tax rate so the Village doesn't have large increases in valuations and taxes every five or six years.

When you are walking your dog, it is important to walk along the curb-line of the street so that your dog leaves it's "business" in the street & near the curb. Then it can be easily picked up by the dog owner and properly disposed of as required under the Pooper Scoop law. It is NOT acceptable to allow your dog to poop on the front lawn or on the planting strip (the area between the curb and the sidewalk) in front of someone's home.
