## WHEN YOU WISH UPON A STAR - RED WHITE AND BLUE

The Ridgefield Park Fourth of July Parade and Celebration will be held on Tuesday, July 4th. The parade was founded in 1894 and is one of the oldest continuous July 4th parades in the United States. The Ridgefield Park Fourth of July Citizens Committee prepares for the Day's event months ahead of time. Many organizations, schools, churches, and families also plan for the day's activities. Invitations are sent to organizations in and outside the community to participate. Emergency Service Units prepare for every possible occurrence so that residents and visitors to the Village can relax and enjoy the day. Mayor John Anlian and the Commissioners welcome all to our Village for these events. Our day begins at 7:30am at Euclid Ave. and Mr. Vernon St. with the reading of the Declaration of Independence and then at 7:45am, the Flag Raising Ceremony by the Boy and Girl Scouts. At 8am the Fire Department presents their personnel and equipment for inspection and honor the milestone anniversaries of their members. The Baby and Youth parade - which begins at 9am at Poplar St. and Euclid Ave - is led by the honor students. In honor of Disney's 100th Anniversary, the theme this year for the Baby & Youth Parade, is "When You Wish Upon a Star." The parade consists of village and visiting children, who walk, ride in decorated carriages, elaborate floats, or personally decorated bicycles. You will see red, white, blue along with your favorite Disney characters on this day. Prizes are awarded and a fun time is had by

The Civic Parade steps off promptly at 11:30am at Preston St. and Hudson Ave. The parade will be led by this year's Grand Marshall Elvira "BeBe" Rohlfs. Fraternal and village organizations, youth and sporting associations, bands and visitors march with pride. Village residents and visitors have enjoyed this event for over a century.

The Grand Finale Concert & Fireworks! The Rutherford Community band will play from 7:30 pm to 9:00 pm and the fireworks will begin around 9:30 pm. ### **NATURE PRESERVE DEDICATION**

On Saturday, June 3rd, the Village of Ridgefield Park held a ribbon cutting ceremony to officially dedicate its new Nature Preserve. The principal speakers were Mayor John Anlian, Environmental Commission Chairman Stephen Quinn, Commissioner William Gerken and former mayor George Fosdick. Also in attendance were three Bergen County Commissioners, Tracy Zurr, Mary Amaroso & Germaine Ortiz; and Adam Strobel, Director of the County Open Space Trust Fund. Cheryl Krouse Deputy Chief Of Staff for Congressional representative Josh Gottheimer, also presented the Mayor with a Certificate from Congress congratulating the Village on its accomplishment. Both Mayor Anlian and Mr. Quinn grew up in the Village; and proposed the creation of a nature preserve back in the early 1970's. Starting in the mid-1980s, the Village slowly acquired different parcels of land to the extent that the nature preserve now consists of approximately 13 acres. Certain sections of the preserve were named after persons who had a significant positive impact on the preserve: Albin Obal, George David Warrington, and George & Susan Fosdick. And signs have been placed in their honor/memory.

Following remarks by local officials and guests, a ribbon cutting ceremony took place; and then Mr. Quinn and others led a guided nature walk through the preserve. Over one hundred people were in attendance at the event.

A special thank you to all who attended this historical event for the Village of Ridgefield Park, and to all of the residents and organizations that have ardently supported this initiative from day-one. It was a long journey, but in the end, it truly took a Village to make this dream a reality. If you would like to visit the Nature Preserve, it is located just north of the Ridgefield Park Jr-Sr. High School - at the end of East Grand Avenue. There is a small parking lot located on the left side of the roadway which is designated for Nature Preserve parking.



### FROM THE HRC

The Ridgefield Park Historic Preservation

Commission would like to welcome its

newest members: Timothy Arata, Theresa Robinson, and Nelson Nunez! For those unfamiliar with the HPC, we are a commission appointed by the Board of Commissioners. Our mission is to review and oversee changes in the architectural appearance of buildings within the Village's Central Business District; and to assure that the appearance of these structures, and the district as a whole, is preserved and enhanced. **District:** The Village's Central Business District is roughly along Main Street from Summit Street to the Post Office at Pine Street and along Mount Vernon Street from Herbert Street to near Bergen Avenue. Some side street sections, such as along Spruce Street are also within the district. **Statement**: The buildings and architectural appearance of our business district possesses a certain character upon which we would like to preserve and improve. Architectural Guidelines have been prepared for reference when properties or businesses decide to make changes affecting the facades of the buildings in the district. The commission reviews applications for all proposed changes within the district using these established Guidelines. Similar guidelines and reviews have been in effect in numerous downtown districts throughout the State, with results that have seen significant improvement to economic growth and property values. Who Must Apply: Anyone who is altering, renovating, or otherwise changing the exterior of a building or property within the district must apply before the Historic Preservation Commission. Work may include, but not be limited to, signs, awnings, lights, storefronts, sidewalks, and painting. It is incumbent upon all property owners within the district to advise potential tenants that they must apply for approval from the Commission for any changes to the exterior of the building, including the space immediately inside a glass storefront. It should also be noted that, where building exteriors are deteriorating or are in need of maintenance, approvals may be granted contingent upon the building owner making necessary improvements.

**NOTE:** backlit, internally lighted, and neon signs are not permitted, lighted/led signs are only permitted if they are installed 2' inside the window. no flashing or scrolling lights/signs permitted.

Applications are available to purchase in the Building Dept. The fee is \$60.00. If you have any questions, reach out to us at histprescomm@ridgefieldpark.org. We meet on the fourth Thursday of the month at 6:00 p.m. on the third floor of the municipal building.

### **RECYCLING 101 -**THE BASIC RULES

If you are a resident of the Village of Ridgefield Park, there is right way to recycle and a wrong way to recycle. Every week many residents do not realize that they are putting materials that do not belong in their recycle bins.

It's actually quite simple. The Ridgefield Park Department of Public Works asks you to only recycle plastics that either have the number 1 or number 2 on the plastic bottle or container. That means any plastic container, lid or bottle that has the numbers 3.4.,5,6, or 7 does not belong in the recycle bin, rather it belongs in the trash. For instance, all plastic bottle caps should also be put in the trash, while any plastic container, lid or bottle that has the number 1 and 2 on it should be washed out before it is placed in your recycle bin.

Now here is where it may get a little complicated with #1 recycles. Plastic bottles with a #1 symbol are good to recycle. However, plastic containers that contain your blueberries or strawberries or salads that have the #1 symbol and the initials PET on them are not acceptable. These containers are sometimes called clamshell containers. A 2016 article by the National Association for PET Container Resources (NAPCOR) identified key issues with recycling PET thermoform containers such as plastic clamshells. These containers often have labels with strong adhesives that are difficult to remove. They produce more fine particles when processed and have a different bulk density than PET bottles. This makes it difficult to process clamshells and bottles together.

When plastic clamshells are processed at material recovery facilities (MRFs), operators and sorting equipment have a hard time differentiating the clamshells from other similarly shaped containers made of different plastics - and from the more desirable PET bottles. So, when the final PET bales are created to be shipped for processing, they are "contaminated" with the plastic clamshells.

It's important to follow these basic rules when recycling. When the wrong plastic is put in a recycle container it could hamper the machinery at the recycling plant that the Village of Ridgefield Park currently contracts with. To help you sort out what goes where, the DPW has developed a great guide to help you navigate the recycling stream. garbage, recycle and cardboard pickups in your neighborhood.

It's also important to know that the DPW no longer picks up newspapers or magazines. Residents can either drop them off at the DPW or call the Knights of Columbus at 201-641-9710 and leave a message to schedule a pick up your newspapers and magazines. Remember, these are just some of the basic rules to follow when putting recyclables in your recycle bin.

We've also sent ten of our employees to a training class for Confined Space Entry. This class is for anyone who enters or works as attendants during confined space entries. The class reviewed OSHA standards and had a thorough review and evaluation of hazards, personal protective equipment, entry procedures and entry equipment. Everyone who attended said it was very informative.

We would like to remind all residents, that leaf season will start up again in the Fall. Please do not place any yard waste in the streets as it will not be picked up. As we prepare for the 4th of July, we would like to wish everyone a safe and happy holiday!!!

#### **RESCUE SQUAD**

This past November the Ridgefield Park Rescue Squad held our annual Fund Drive. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all the residents and business who so generously contributed to this year's appeal. It is your generosity and recognition that make it possible for us to continue to serve this community.

This past December, the Ridgefield Park Rescue Squad was invited to an Emergency Services Appreciation Luncheon, presented by the OCM Grace Church located at 90 Mount Vernon Street in the Village. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Pastor John Maxham, Brianne Heaney and the wonderful members of the congregation for providing us with an appetizing selection of food and drink and all the "much appreciated" thank you cards. All members of the Rescue Squad appreciate being recognized for their dedication to the residents of this community.

This past March members of the Ridgefield Park Rescue Squad attended a 16 hour Confined Space/Trench Rescue Operations course held at the Bergen County Emergency Services Training Center in Paramus and the Bergen County Fire Academy in Mahwah. The members of the Rescue Squad continue to learn and train on their own time to better serve this community.

On March 13, 2023 the Ridgefield Park Rescue Squad took delivery of a new Hurst (Jaws of Life) rescue tool. This new rescue tool is a major upgrade to our service. It is battery operated which allows us to save precious time getting the tool into service at a motor vehicle accident or other rescue scene. On Sunday morning April 23 the members of the Rescue Squad took park in a motor vehicle accident rescue drill hosted by the Bogota Rescue Squad in conjunction with the Teaneck Volunteer Ambulance Corp.

This provided the members of the Rescue Squad a great opportunity to gain experience and practice in using our new rescue tool (and test it under adverse weather conditions-a steady soaking rain).

#### THE JOY OF SPRING

Warming weather... Longer daylight hours... Outdoor activities... Flowers blooming... Birds singing. And trees leafing out providing a canopy of beautiful shade trees for the Village.

Planting and maintaining the trees for that canopy is a year round activity, but spring is the busiest time. This spring the DPW planted 66 trees throughout the Village along the streets, in the parks, and on the street medians. The new species include Redbud, London Plane, Plum, Serviceberry, Oak, Cherry, Linden, Dogwood, Maple, Tupelo, Sassafras, and Persimmon. The Shade Tree Commission(STC) appreciates the great work the DPW did in planting, staking, and attaching Gator bags to the new trees - plus all the work they do year round in assessing, trimming, removing trees and then collecting the leaves! Help keep the trees healthy so that the trees can, in turn, help to keep the environment healthy. The new trees, as well as established trees, need care. During the summer heat, if a tree in the neighborhood looks dry, please make sure that the gator bags are filled with water. Place the hose in the opening at the top of the bag between the two layers and fill the bag with water which will dispense the water slowly through small holes at the bottom. Older trees need water, too, especially if there's a



Reimbursement for repairs are only available by making an application, having the application approved, and using STC approved contractors. Unauthorized work, and /or, damage to tree roots, will be subject to fines.



### **MOSQUITO HABITAT CHECKLIST**



# Container mosquitoes are the #1 mosquito problem in Bergen County!

### **WATER +7 DAYS = MOSQUITOES**

Use this checklist to help you find and eliminate all the places that mosquitoes breed around your home. Any container that holds water can be a home for mosquito larvae. After 7 days, larvae will emerge as adult mosquitoes. Remember to stay vigilant and to keep containers free of standing water all year long.

<sup>\*</sup> A note about Bti - Ideally, keep containers dry or discard if unneeded. If you do need to treat for mosquito larvae in a container, use the low impact pesticide Bti (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis). It is available at many hardware stores, pond supply stores and online. Bti effectively targets mosquito larvae. It can be purchased as a granule, briquette, or liquid. Be sure to choose a product that is registered with the US EPA, labeled to use for mosquito larva. Closely follow the directions on the label. You may only use these products on your property; if you see a source of standing water elsewhere, call the Bergen County Mosquito Control Division.



The primary strategy for mosquito control relies on an Integrated Pest Management approach that focuses on controlling mosquito larvae versus broad control of adult mosquitoes. Much of the effort is on source control-- reducing or eliminating the standing water where mosquito larvae live. This checklist can help you do your part to control mosquitoes in your landscape.
