"LITTLE LIBRARY. BIG IMPACT."

In 2009, a man named Todd Bol deconstructed a garage door and fashioned something odd - a small house on a stick that held books. This was the first Little Free Library in the United States, and what began as a tribute to Bol's bookworm mother soon spread throughout the nation - and beyond. Currently, there are 150,000+Little Libraries across the globe. The most common model is a wooden box on an elevated post, but many people like to get creative with their designs (check out

to get creative with their designs (check out littlefreelibrary.org for some great ideas!). They contain reading material for all ages, spanning all genres. Anyone can, free of charge, take a book; however, they have to leave one in its place. This policy of "take a book, leave a book" is what keeps the Little Library going and consistently provides different reading material. SHADE TREE COMMISSION

Love those trees and their shade!
During the summer heat wave, the cooling effect of trees became obvious to Ridgefield Park residents! Temperatures in the shade ranged 10-20 degrees cooler than the high 90's and 100 degrees in the sun evidenced by bus riders cooling under trees, park visitors cooling in the shade and walkers cooling on shady streets.

In addition to this very real positive impact on the Village, trees provide other benefits: USDA indicates trees can reduce AC needs by 30 percent and save 20-50 percent in energy for heating

A US Forest Study found that property values increase more if there are trees The STC encourages support and cooperation from property owners in taking care of this important Village asset. First, even in the fall, a reminder to continue to fill the Gator bags; Also, young trees planted in recent years as well as mature trees need regular watering(a deep soaking once a week) during hot dry periods. Do not use lawn movers, weed whackers or weed killers near trees. Any of these can severely damage a tree.

Central Avenue Project New curbs and road paving on Central necessitated removal of some street trees, but 2023 spring planting will locate new trees in appropriate sites along Central Avenue. Utility Lines and Trees
The STC has consulted with DPW and PSE&G about residents' concerns regarding trees and utility lines. If there are tree branches around the house drop(wires from utility pole to house)lines, contact DPW to request them to trim branches away from drop lines to remove hazards. However, DPW because of safety rules cannot work on tree branches around the utility lines which go from pole to pole.

If there is a concern or a dangerous situation with branches in the utility lines going from pole to pole call the PSE&G customer service line to request line clearing. The customer service number provided by PSE&G is: 1-800-436-7734.

Tree Species in Spotlight

The spotlight this issue is on the Scarlet Oak, Quercus coccinea, a medium to large tree that can reach 70 to 80 feet in height with a single trunk 2 to 3 feet in diameter. The Scarlet Oak is similar to the red oaks. There are bright red flowers that hang on slender catkins 3" to 4" long. Its acorns are a favorite food for large birds, chipmunks, and squirrels. Brilliant red or scarlet autumn fall leaves make it a frequent choice along streets and in yards.

HOUSEHOLD BATTERY RECYCLING AT THE DPW

Your recycling center now has a place to deposit certain types of used household batteries. The drop off box is in the same container as the plastic bag recycling bins at 24 Industrial Avenue.

Acceptable battery types are listed below. Place batteries in plastic bags that are sealed. Plastic bags are provided at the drop off location. Seal the bag(s) and place them in the container. 9V batteries have raised terminals and they must be taped before putting them in the bag.

Acceptable Batteries No Defective or Damaged Batteries Rechargeables:

Lithium Ion (Li-lon)
Nickel Cadmium (Ni-Cd)
Nickel Metal Hydride (Ni-MH)
Nickel Zinc (Ni-Zn)
Small Sealed Lead Acid (SSLA/Pb)

Single Use (alkaline)

AA, AAA, 9V*, C, D and button *tape to cover raised terminal Lithium Primary

DPW NEWS

As fall is about to start and leaf season is just around the corner, here are a few reminders about how to put leaves out to the street for pickup.

A. They must come from your property and put in the street next to the curb that surrounds your property. You can not put the leaves on town property (parks, lots or town buildings). If you want to put it on your curb strip. That is acceptable however, debris must be in a barrel no bigger then 35 gallons or in the brown lawn bags.

- 1. Sticks, branches, limbs, logs, plants, bushes, vegetable garden, debris, are not permitted in piles.
- 2.Please keep kids and pets out of leaf piles. Our workers cannot see if anyone may be in the piles and this can lead to serious injury or death.
- 3.Don't Park cars on top of piles, this can cause a fire.
- 4. Try to get the leaves done before the first snow fall.
- 5.Make sure that the pile is all the way into the street so the pusher can do its job. If it is on the sidewalk or the apron of the driveway the leaves will not be able to be pushed correctly and will leave unwanted debris behind.

Please keep in mind that during the heavy part of leaf season the sweeper can only pick up so much and may leave some debris behind. In advance, we thank you for your patience.

As of January 1, 2023, we will be fully enforcing the rules that are already existing and may possibly make some small changes on how garbage, yard waste, trash and recycling is put out at the curb. We are trying to avoid having our garbage loads refused at the dump site as well as avoid being charged for contaminated recycling and bulk waste on regular garbage days. Another reason, but most important reason for this is we have had employees get hurt because rules were not followed. "We will be at the street fair having one-on-one conversations and answering any questions you may have even if they don't pertain to garbage." Please visit our table at the street fair on Main Street on September 17, 2022. We will be in front of the municipal building. Our goal is to educate the public of proper garbage, recycling, and yard waste disposal. We will be there to be have one-on-one conversations with the residents and to answer any questions you may have even if it doesn't pertain to garbage. We hope to see you there!

"NATIVE MILKWEED KNOCKS OUT LANTERNFLIES"

Most people have heard about spotted lanternflies - an invasive species that is currently spreading throughout the U.S. The growth of their population stands to compromise America's wood and fruit supply, and it's our duty to ensure this doesn't occur. States are urging people to kill lanternflies to stop the spread. There's even a campaign here in New Jersey called "Stomp it Out"! The slogan is now on billboards across the state. Scientists who've been studying this phenomena have found that there are additional things you can do to stop the spread of these pests. One would be removing any Trees of Heaven (Ailanthus altissima), the lanternflies' host plant/tree in your area. Another would be planting native flowers - particularly milkweed, the host plant for the monarch butterfly! Developing research shows that the chemicals in milkweed are poisonous to the lanternflies. Moreover, when monarch butterflies eat milkweed, the same chemicals protect the monarchs because predators are less likely to eat them. Planting milkweed will help monarch butterflies survive and assist in driving lanternflies away from our community by taking away their food/breeding grounds. If you're unsure of which type to go with, choose Common milkweed or Swamp

milkweed! Also visit

With Ridgefield Park Schools scheduled to open on September 8, we ask that all motorists be cautious with children attempting to get to school. Every fall, over 55 million children across the United States head back to school. With 13 percent of those children typically walking or biking to their classes, AAA warns drivers to be especially vigilant for pedestrians before and after school hours. The afternoon hours are particularly dangerous - over the last decade, nearly one in four child pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. Slow down: Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling just 10 mph faster. Come to a complete stop: Research shows that more than one-third of drivers roll through stop signs in school zones or neighborhoods. Always come to a complete stop, checking carefully for children on sidewalks and in crosswalks before proceeding.

Eliminate distractions: Research shows that taking your eyes off the road for just two seconds doubles your chances of crashing. Children can be quick, crossing the road unexpectedly or emerging suddenly between two parked vehicles. Reduce risk by not using your cell phone or eating while driving, for example.

Reverse responsibly: Every vehicle has blind spots. Check for children on the sidewalk, in the driveway and around your vehicle before slowly backing. Please do not rely solely on a vehicle's back-up camera. Resident Vehicle Awareness

We would also like to remind residents to remove key fobs from their vehicles and always lock their vehicle doors. A great deal of vehicle thefts have involved vehicles which have had key fobs left inside. Similarly, a great deal of vehicle burglaries have involved vehicles which had been left unlocked. These crimes often occur, but not exclusively, overnight. Unfortunately, there also continues to be a rise in catalytic converter thefts throughout the county and state. These thefts involve a sawzall, which can at times be heard during the late night or very early morning hours when these thefts commonly take place. Please remain vigilant and report any suspicious behavior.

Fire Prevention Week celebrates it's 100th Anniversary!!

This year Fire Prevention Week is October 9th through October 15th and the theme is

• Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape.". This year's theme promotes potentially life-saving messages that can mean the difference between life and death in a fire. Developing a home escape plan with all members of the household and practicing it regularly ensures that everyone knows what to do when the smoke alarm sounds and uses that time wisely.

Following are key messages behind this year's "Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape" theme:

- Make sure your home escape plan meets the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of your home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.
- Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows open easily.
- Have an outside meeting place a safe distance from your home where everyone should meet.
- Practice your home fire drill at least twice a year with everyone in the household, including guests. Practice at least once during the day and at night. As the biggest annual campaign at NFPA, Fire Prevention Week works to educate people about the leading risks to home fires and ways they can better protect themselves and their loved ones.
