The State will not issue a raffle license unless you are a registered organization. To register:

### PEDESTRIAN SAFETY (39:4-36)

NJSA 39:4-36 states that a driver must stop and yield to pedestrians that are in a marked or unmarked crosswalk where two streets intersect or when turning at an intersection that is controlled by a traffic signal.

Just as big a problem as motorists who fail to yield to pedestrians in a crosswalk are pedestrians who walk out into the street and expect a motor vehicle, in transit, to suddenly come to a complete stop. This is unrealistic and very dangerous. Pedestrians are expected to utilize crosswalks while crossing the street so that they may be seen by drivers more easily. Pedestrians also need to exercise caution when crossing the street and make sure the roadway is clear before proceeding within the crosswalk. Pedestrians **SHOULD NOT** under any circumstances become distracted by talking or texting on their mobile devices while crossing the street.

Juveniles and adults alike should wear reflective clothing while walking or riding bicycles at night when poor visibility becomes a bigger factor. Motorists must also stay off of their cell phones and avoid other unnecessary distractions especially when approaching intersections. Let's work together to keep everyone safe.

### R.P.P.D. Security Awareness

The Ridgefield Park Police Department would like to remind residents to LOCK their car doors. With the warm weather approaching, thieves will go out at all times of the day and night to prey on vehicles that are left unlocked. Thieves will go up and down the street, enter driveways and pull on vehicle door handles until they find an unlocked door. The thieves will then enter the vehicle and take anything of value. Common targets are cell phones, wallets, pocketbooks, packages, laptop computers, loose change and anything else they can get their hands on. If items containing personal information such as driver's licenses, credit card statements, checkbooks, bank statements and any other identifying information are obtained by thieves, this could lead to identity theft and fraud.

The best way to deter this type of crime is to keep your windows shut and doors locked at all times. Very rarely have we observed thieves smash a window to obtain items from inside a vehicle, but it is also strongly recommended that you not leave electronic devices, packages, money, wallets, pocketbooks, cell phones or any other items of value in plain view inside of your vehicle even if it is locked. Most importantly, please **DO NOT** leave key fobs inside of your vehicles!

### **ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION:**

Wise Watering

Water only those plants that need supplemental water. The following plants do not need water:

- -- established trees and shrubs
- -- established perennials and ornamental grasses
- -- established lawns (see below)

### Water correctly during establishment.

Newly installed plants need time to grow their roots into the new soil. This is called establishment. Establishment takes from a few days to a full growing season for perennials, a full growing season for shrubs, and several years for trees. During this time, most plants need supplemental water during dry periods. Provide a total of 1 to 1½" of water per week during dry periods only. This includes both rainfall and irrigation.

Water deeply but infrequently. Watering lawns for a very brief time almost daily encourages shallow root growth (and fungus infections), whereas infrequent, deep watering like one inch per week, encourages healthy root growth.

Water at the right time. The best time is early in the morning. Bad times are during bright sunlight or rain.

Retrofit sprinkler systems to save water. Install sensors that detect soil moisture. Replace sprinkler heads with targeted units that direct water only on to the plants (not on to hardscape).

Tolerate dormant lawns in summer. Most lawn grasses are cool-season species that go dormant (turn brown) during our hot summers. They green up again as soon as the weather cools off in fall.



### WHAT'S A GREEN TEAM?

As a Village, we know the importance of protecting our surrounding natural resources. The Green Team focuses on ways to make our Village sustainable as well as adaptable. We support both improving our environment and maintaining the well-being of our residents. Accomplishing these goals takes creativity.

Part of being sustainable, is to try to reimagine how we can use a typical item in a new way. For example, the plastic bag recycling program has led to the village earning free Trex benches. Recycled "Styrofoam" coolers and packaging is used to create moldings for homes. Instead of throwing out household items, place them in the re-use area. With a little cleaning up, new paint or minor repairs, it can have a new life as well as a new home. Clothing can be recycled by donating for others to use. As much as we focus on what some would say are environmentally based programs, we also benefit from using our creative assets. The artist or poet or musician or dancer are all assets to our village. They help to make our village a more vibrant community.

As the Green Team, we think outside the box to create events and coordinate activities that will help us achieve these goals. We collaborate with other organizations for some activities.

Our Village is recognized by Sustainable Jersey, a non-profit organization, as achieving Silver Certification. 64 out of 457 municipalities qualified for Silver at the state level. We are one of 8 at the county level. Besides being prestigious, it also enables us grant opportunities.

## **BODY-WORN CAMERAS** (P.L. 2020, CHAPTER 128)

On November 24, 2020, Governor Murphy signed historic legislation, P.L. 2020, Chapter 128, requiring that by June 1, 2021 every uniformed patrol officer in New Jersey wear a body-worn camera while on duty. In compliance with the recently signed legislation, the RPPD has ordered new Panasonic body-worn cameras for each of its officers. The department will soon be transitioning from in-vehicle cameras and audio mic packs to body-worn cameras. Due to high demand and the number of body-worn camera orders in the state, the RPPD is still awaiting the arrival of its cameras. We hope to have these cameras delivered and promptly put in use this summer season. Our goal is to continue to provide our residents with the same courteous and professional service, while also adapting to today's new standards in an effort to promote transparency and accountability within our community.



## ALL THROUGH THE PANDEMIC, OUR SCHOOLS HAVE SHONE BRIGHTLY

During the past two SCHOOL YEARS, the impact of the global pandemic was unprecedented in our history. Yet, our Board of Education - under the leadership of our Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Angela Bender, took action so that our schools remained an active and functioning school system. ### CELEBRATING THE 4TH ON THE 5TH

The Ridgefield Park Fourth of July Parade and Celebration will be held on Monday July 5th since the 4th is a Sunday. The parade was founded in 1894 and is one of the oldest parades in the United States. The Ridgefield Park Fourth of July Citizens Committee prepares for the day's events months ahead of time. Many organizations, schools, churches and families also plan for the day's activities. Invitations are sent to organizations in and outside the community to participate. Emergency Service Units prepare for every possible occurrence so that residents and visitors to the Village can relax and enjoy the day. The Mayor and Commissioners welcome all to our Village for these events.

Our day begins at 7:30 am at Euclid Ave. and Mt. Vernon St. with the reading of the Declaration of Independence and then at 7:45 am, the Flag Raising Ceremony by the Boy and Girl Scouts. At 8am the Fire Department and Emergency Units present their personnel and equipment for inspection and honor the milestone anniversaries of their member.

The Baby & Youth Parade, first of two parades, begins at 9am at Poplar St. and Euclid Ave. Honor students lead the parade. ### SHADE TREE COMMISSION

The STC is responsible for planting and caring for trees in Village parks, on school grounds and on all public areas, or along our streets in the public rights-of-ways, which generally extends 7 feet or so inside the curb line. Note that only STC members, the Village DPW, our professional arborists, and public entities such as PSE&G may plant, prune or otherwise care for those trees.

STC members are required by State law to attend educational classes about the needs of trees. As an example, several members each year attend the NJ Shade Tree Federation Conference to learn about tree issues. All of this training improves the Village's protection against lawsuits.

This Spring, we planted 62 trees, with the DPW doing the actual planting. THANK YOU DPW! We plant a variety of tree species, especially native trees, and take care to plant the new trees in appropriate locations.

The DPW follows up during the summer by watering our new trees. But, we could use help. So, if possible, we ask that homeowners water the new trees during the days of hot dry weather.

An ongoing aspect of the STC is responding to residents' concerns about trees. Please let us know about your concerns.

We now have a committee of Block Rangers - volunteers who keep an eye on the trees in their neighborhoods. So, if you have a little time, please join us in this effort. We encourage all residents to care for the trees on your own properties; and keep a watch over other trees in your neighborhoods.

Unfortunately, during this past year of Covid, we were unable to celebrate Arbor Day. But, next year we plan on resuming this long standing tradition of our Village. As part of this celebration, we have students from our schools participate in art, poetry and similar projects which emphasize the benefits of trees.

We also have a Sidewalk Safety program where the STC will assist homeowners in repairing or replacing sidewalks which have been impacted by tree roots. See the Village website for forms concerning this program.


