#### MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

This year marks the 125th anniversary of the formation of the first volunteer fire companies in our Village — Hose Company No. 1 and the Friendship Hook & Ladder Company. On duty 365/24/7, these volunteers answer calls day and night, in all weather, to serve neighbors, friends, and strangers. It may be a surprise to some to learn that our Fire Department is still 100% volunteer. Men and women dedicated to serving the community, building on a rich history and tradition of exemplary service. New volunteers are both needed and welcomed. The Board of Commissioners, on behalf of all in the Village, salutes and commends the Ridgefield Park Volunteer Fire Department. Thank you for your very fine service to the community. #### **RAFFLES**

All Clubs, Organizations, PTAs or Individuals that conduct 50/50's, tricky trays, basket raffles, bingo, casino nights, or any other type of raffle must register with the State of New Jersey Legalized Games of Chance Commission to obtain an Identification Number. Only after obtain-

ing this ID number can you apply for a raffle license.

The State will not issue a raffle license unless you are a registered organization. To register: www.njconsumeraffairs.gov/lgccc

Failure to comply can result in your event being shut down.

Raffle license applications are available in the Village Clerk's office. Applications must be completed no less than 6 weeks prior to your raffle.

#### PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS

Property Tax Payments can now be made online using a debit/credit card, or your bank account information. There will be convenience fees charged for this service. The convenience fee is charged by the provider and not the Village. To make a payment, visit the Village website: www.ridgefieldpark.org and click on the link: "Make online property tax payments"

When making tax payments, by mail or in person, please submit your entire tax bill for receipting purposes. If making payments by mail, please include a self-addressed stamped envelope if you request a receipt.

#### **NEW Website**

We have incorporated an "Event Calendar" to post ALL Village events/ fundraisers. This will assist organizations with choosing dates that are NOT in conflict with other scheduled events.

## SCHOOL IS OPEN, DRIVE CAREFULLY

Every fall, over 55 million children across the United States head back to school. With 13 percent of those children typically walking or biking to their classes, AAA warns drivers to be especially vigilant for pedestrians before and after school hours. The afternoon hours are particularly dangerous — over the last decade, nearly one in four child pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m.

**Slow down:** Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling just 10 mph faster.

Come to a complete stop: Research shows that more than one-third of drivers roll through stop signs in school zones or neighborhoods. Always come to a complete stop, checking carefully for children on sidewalks and in crosswalks before proceeding.

Eliminate distractions: Research shows that taking your eyes off the road for just two seconds doubles your chances of crashing. Children can be quick, crossing the road unexpectedly or emerging suddenly between two parked cars. Reduce risk by not using your cell phone or eating while driving, for example.

**Reverse responsibly:** Every vehicle has blind spots. Check for children on the sidewalk, in the driveway and around your vehicle before slowly backing up. Teach your children to never play in, under or around vehicles.

Taxicabs and Limousines No vehicle with taxi or limousine license plates from any state and no vehicle for hire used for the purpose of the transportation of passengers shall be parked on any day of the week on any street within the Village of Ridgefield Park between the hours of 10:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. (Village Ordinance 351-5.1)

**Pedestrian Safety** (39:4-36) NJSA 39:4-36 states that a driver must stop and yield to pedestrians that are in a marked or unmarked crosswalk where two streets intersect or when turning at an intersection that is controlled by a traffic light. Failure to observe the law may subject you to:

- 2 points on your license
- \$200.00 fine plus court costs
- 15 days of community service

Just as big a problem as motorists who fail to yield to pedestrians in a crosswalk are pedestrians who walk out into the street and expect a motor vehicle, in transit, to suddenly come to a complete stop. This is unrealistic and very dangerous. Pedestrians

are expected to utilize crosswalks while crossing the street so that they may be seen by drivers more easily. Pedestrians also need to use common sense when crossing the street and look both ways for approaching vehicles. Make sure the roadway is clear before proceeding within the crosswalk. Pedestrians SHOULD NOT under any circumstances become distracted by talking or texting on their cell phones or other mobile devices while crossing the street.

Juveniles and adults alike should also wear reflective clothing while walking or riding bicycles at night when poor visibility becomes a bigger factor. Motorists need to stay off of their cell phones and avoid other unnecessary distractions especially when approaching intersections. Let's work together to keep everyone safe.

No Overnight Truck Parking Village residents are reminded that they are not permitted to park any truck, bus, tractor, trailer, semi-trailer, boat, camper or other motor vehicle with a gross vehicle weight of more than 5,500 pounds and/or a length of more than 18 feet and/or a height of more than seven feet and/or equipped with more than four tires and/or equipped with any fixed appurtenance on any day of the week on any street within the Village of Ridgefield Park between the hours of 10:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. (Village Ordinance 197-10)

Please remember volunteers run these programs and they will get back to you as soon as possible.

Please be on the look-out for registra-

tion forms and news from the Board of Recreation in the Principal's Message you receive from your child's school. All forms are distributed electronically now so you can print it from there or on the Village website.

There is an insurance requirement that all coaches, referees and officials involved in sports programs need to successfully complete a program on the new Sports Concussion policy protocol. This needs to be done before anyone participates in a sports program. If you plan on participating in a sport in the future, please be sure to complete this free on-line course at your convenience. You must forward your certificate of completion to the Board of Recreation before you will be permitted to participate in any sports program.

The link for this website with the new Sports Concussion policy protocol is www. NJMEL.org. New Jersey law is requiring that all organizations who use the Board of Education facilities comply with this program. The online training section has a link to a 40 minute free concussion training program and mini exam and at the conclusion the coach or parent will be able to print a certificate of completion.

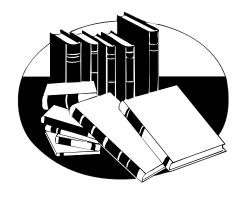

#### MAKE A CHANGE - LEAVE THE LEAVES

Leaves die and fall to the ground where they enhance the soil by releasing nutrients and fertilizing it. This improvement to the soil benefits your property.

You can use them as natural mulch and fertilizer instead of raking or blowing them into the street where they can take up parking spots and clog drains. And, its FREE.

Here's how it is done:

Mulch when you mow. Wait for a layer to accumulate and mow over them. Don't collect the clippings. By shredding the leaves into very small pieces they break down fast. You may have to do this a few times depending upon the type and number of trees that you have. A mulching blade installed on your lawnmower can make quick work of this too.

**Keep the leaves under your plants.** The leaves beneath your shrubs and plants are free winter mulch. So you will need less mulch each year.

Save leaves for your compost. When you compost, you need a lot of leaves so save as many as you want and add them to your compost throughout the year.

Any time trash is mixed in with recycling it's contaminated and everything goes into the trash on pickup day. No milk or juice cartons, plastic bags, cardboard or newspapers belong in the RECYCLE section.

If the container is full, look for another one. And if you happen to see someone putting trash into the recycle section, ask them to stop.

## FALL FISHING DERBY SLATED FOR SAT. NOV. 4

The Ridgefield Park Environmental Commission is teaming up with the Hudson River Fishermen's Association to host a Fishing Derby for those who are the ages of 15 or under.

The derby is scheduled to take place on Saturday November 4 (Rain Date Sunday Nov. 5) from 10 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at Waterfront Park located at 24 Industrial Avenue in Ridgefield Park behind the Village's DPW building.

The Hudson River Fishermen's Association will supply tackle and bait. There will be plenty of volunteers on hand to help with baiting hooks and teaching those how to cast their fishing line.

"Recreational fishing has certainly staged a modest comeback along the Hackensack River," said Steve Quinn, Chairman of the Ridgefield Park Environmental Commission. "We want our youth to enjoy the waterways that surround our village, and at the same time remind them that much work needs to be done to improve the river's water quality."

According to Quinn, the Ridgefield Park Environmental Commission will be awarding prizes for a variety of categories such as biggest catch. "It's going to be a fun day and an educational experience as well," said Quinn. Trees Like Donuts!!!

Who doesn't like donuts? These donuts, however, aren't for human consumption but rather the mulch type for keeping trees healthy! Improper mulching kills trees! Mulch should never be piled up in a cone shape like a volcano around a tree trunk but instead spread in a donut shape.

The following information about mulching is from the NJ DEP Division of Parks and Forestry Program: How to mulch the right way

Start 4-6 inches from the tree trunk at ground level and mulch outward to the edge of the dripline to a maximum depth of 2-4 inches.

Never pile-up a cone of mulch around tree trunk because that provides a place for mice, insects, and fungus to hide next to trunk and feed on parts of the tree. Mulch piled too thick can also prevent water from reaching a tree's roots.

One layer of woven Landscape Fabric may be used under mulch in heavy weed areas. Never use plastic sheets under mulch which could block the passage of air and water and stunt root growth.

Every spring or every other spring, rake or remove any hard crust and add only enough new mulch to maintain a 2-4 inch layer. Don't build up layers by adding new mulch on top of old mulch around a tree.

#### Best and worst mulch materials

Good:

Bark chunks or shredded bark that is at least 3/8 inch in size. Pine bark will last longer than hardwood bark.

Pine needles

One year-old wood chips

Leaves that were shredded and composted for at least three months.

Worst:

Fresh grass clippings or fresh wood chips Any fresh organic mulch Any organic mulch that smells bad Peat moss or sawdust Pebbles, rocks, or cobble stones Bricks or pavement or black plastic Ground-up rubber tires

### Why all the fuss about mulch?! Mulch helps:

Keep lawn mowers and string trimmers away from bark. Damaged bark is an open wound that can be

infected by fungus and bacteria.

Soil hold water for tree's roots

Prevent soil compaction that suffocates a tree's roots

Add organic matter to soil as it gradually breaks down

Prevent soil from washing away

Reduce damage from drought and from pests Moderate soil temperature keeping soil cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter Reduce weeds and grasses around trees which compete with tree's roots for water and for nutrients

**Tree Facts** Not only do trees visually improve our lives but they are living, organic, chemical factories producing both beneficial and harmful chemicals and even tasty chemicals like maple syrup!

From Tree Law, here are few examples: Aspirin comes from the bark of the white willow.

Cinchoma tree bark is used to make



quinine (for treating malaria), and gin and tonic. The bark of the Yew helps produce taxol, which can stall some human cancers Other silvichemicals (chemicals from trees) include turpentine (found in paint, varnish, adhesives, printing, ink, soaps, disinfectants, chewing gum, mouthwash, toothpaste, and shampoo)

Sidewalk Repair The STC has the Sidewalk Safety Program for sidewalks that need lifting or replacing due to Village tree roots. Property owners have to initiate action; to do so obtain application forms from Town Hall or on the Village website and then return the completed forms to the STC. A STC member will inspect the

site and determine if or what repairs are caused by a Village tree and therefore reimbursable. The property owner is responsible for contacting a contractor who has been approved by the STC to schedule the repairs. Property owners will not be reimbursed for work done without preapproval by STC or by a contractor who is not STC approved.

Once the contractor has completed the repairs, the property owner is required to pay the contractor and then submit a copy of the paid invoice to the STC for reimbursement.

Eighteen properties have had sidewalk repairs so far this year, currently, there is a waiting list but submit an application because the work is done according to the date the application is received.

**REMINDERS** According to Village Ordinance 3-79 no one can fasten any sign for garage sale, lost pet, etc to any Village shade tree.

If there is a concern about a Village tree, contact the STC either by letter addressed to 234 Main Street; phone 201-641-4950, extension 640, or by attending a meeting. Always provide your name, phone number, and concern along with the address of the tree site- You will be contacted after a STC meeting; the STC meets on the second and fourth Mondays at 7:30 pm. in the third floor conference room.

Enjoy the spectacular fall foliage!

#### GARBAGE RECEPTACLES:



Garbage and recycling receptacles are susceptible to rodents and insects. Please keep garbage in a covered receptacle. Rinsing them with water and bleach will help to keep them clean and detract pests.

<u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: All trash containers must be 32 gallons or less. The contents must be lifted by one person. <u>DO NOT purchase the extra-large trash containers that are made for machinery to lift.</u>

These include wheeled containers with a bar instead of handles and flip back tops. They cannot be emptied by one person safely. Oversized receptacles will be tagged. Repeated use of oversized cans will result in confiscation of receptacle. <u>Bags cannot weigh more than 30 lbs</u>. Do NOT fill your garbage can with rocks or dirt. Do not allow it to fill with water. Yard waste limit is **35 pounds** per container.

#### **LEAF SEASON**



LEAF SEASON begins on October 15th and ends on December 31<sup>st</sup>. Leaves must be placed in the street-along the curb line in front of your home on the alternate side parking day, when the sweeper is due to pass. It is a violation of Village of Ridgefield Park ordinance to sweep, cast or throw anything into the gutter except leaves during designated leaf season. Leaves can also be placed in a trash can or PAPER bags.

#### **PARK PERMITS:**

Park permits can be obtained from the DPW for Veterans, Brewster and Hunter parks. Groups of 10 or more are required to request a permit and pay the appropriate fees. Residents may contact the DPW 201-440-4860. All park usage is on a first come, first serve basis. This includes sports field use.

#### PAPER SHREDDING:

• The DPW will once again hold a paper shredding day on Saturday, October 28, 2017 at 24 Industrial Avenue from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. This FREE event will provide residents and businesses the opportunity to have their sensitive documents safely shredded and recycled. If you have any questions, please call the DPW at 201-440-4860.

#### POT HOLES:



Please report potholes to the DPW @ 201-440-4860

#### RAIN WATER:



Catch basins are designed to slow the release of the rain water into the storm sewer system. Debris collects on top of the catch basin, preventing it from entering the system while also slowing the draining process. DPW crews clear this debris after heavy rainfalls. Report excessive accumulation of debris to the DPW. It is unlawful to put anything into the catch basin. This includes motor oil, cooking oil, pet waste or other debris.

#### RECYCLING CENTER

The recycling center is located at 24 Industrial Avenue.

Residents can drop off recyclable items from 9 AM to 12PM (NOON), Monday through Saturday. A "REUSE" area is now available. Residents can leave serviceable items they no longer need, which may be of use to other residents. This is at the discretion of the recycling coordinator and limited to space constraints.

Only small amounts of trash will be accepted and proof of residency is required.

You may be required to show a valid building permit for construction materials.

NO COMMERCIAL VEHICLES\*NO CONTRACTOR WASTE PERMITTED\*NO HOUSE CLEAN-OUTS

#### **SCAVENGERS:**



Scavenging is against the law, Village ordinance prohibits the removal of any curbside trash/recyclables by anyone other than a DPW employee or agent. The village receives revenue from some collections, which helps to offset disposal and equipment costs. Call the Police Department @ 201-641-6400, if you notice scavengers in your area.

#### SIDEWALKS:



Homeowners are responsible for the maintenance of sidewalks surrounding their property. Please keep sidewalks clear of debris. Bushes also need to be trimmed to allow safe use of sidewalks. Low hanging branches can be reported to the DPW. The Shade Tree Commission has a program to assist homeowners with sidewalks damaged by trees. They can be contacted @ 201-641-4950 x 640.

#### STREET SWEEPING



The street sweeper is scheduled to clean in front of your home once each week, weather permitting. If you check the half-day parking ban signs in front of your home, you will know when the street will be cleaned. Alternate Side Parking is in effect whether the sweeper is out or not, so please move your vehicle as noted.

#### WHITE GOODS



WHITE GOODS and tires <u>must be called into the DPW</u> before they are placed at the curb. WHITE GOODS include: Tires, Computers, Electronics, TVs, and Air Conditioners & Appliances.

**Note:** Refrigerators and freezers must have doors removed & unit should be laid flat to prevent injury. Call 201-440-4860, give address, place item at the curb Tuesday night for Wednesday

pick-up. Failure to call will result in the item remaining at the curb and you may be subject to a fine.

#### YARD WASTE:



Yard waste consists of grass clippings, garden vines, leaves tree branches, shrubbery. Stones, gravel, rocks, dirt and sod will NOT be picked up. Yard waste must be put into a container or PAPER bag weighing no more than 35 lbs. Do NOT rake yard waste into the street. Tree branches and brush should be cut into 4 ft. lengths and tied into manageable bundles. Place yard waste on the curb the night before your collection day.

#### **PLEASE NOTE:**



#### All trash containers must be 32 gallons or less!

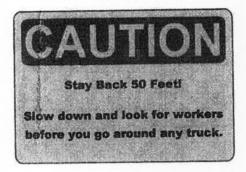

NJ Legislation has passed a bill (A-4452), effective May 1, 2017, which adds SANITATION VEHICLES to the existing "Slow Down/Move Over" law. The bill, referred to as "Michael Massey's Law", follows the death of Freehold resident Michael Massey, an Ocean County public works employee who was killed in a 2013 motor vehicle crash while working.

The law REQUIRES motorists to reduce their speed and change lanes when approaching authorized vehicleswhich now includes sanitation vehicles. The law also requires sanitation vehicles to display flashing amber lights while stopped on a street and while engaged in the collection of garbage or while moving between stops
