

The Village of Ridgefield Park's Every Day is Earth Day celebration is set for Saturday May 11 from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Riverfront Park, located behind the Department of Public Works building located at 24 Industrial Avenue. Hosted by the Ridgefield Park Environmental Commission, the day starts off with multiple interactive shows featuring lessons on different animal species and scientific demonstrations.

The fun continues with eco-cruises from the Riverkeeper along the Hackensack River, all-day music provided by Mark Rust, face painting and environmental exhibits and demonstrations throughout the day. Neighborhood Compost, a New Jersey subscription-based compost pick-up service and circular home shop will be providing demonstrations throughout the day and encouraging additional Ridgefield Park residents to sign up for the Village's pilot compost program.

Once again, the Hudson River Fisherman's Association will be on hand to help those who would like to fish on the Hackensack River with a catch and release program. The association will be providing fishing equipment for those who don't have their own fishing gear. The Board of Recreation will also be offering a mini archery clinic throughout the day.

Mayor John Anlian said, "This year's Earth Day celebration features a number of fun and educational activities for the residents of Ridgefield Park and their families. It is a day for us all to celebrate all the natural resources our Village has to offer all of us."

"The day is all about raising awareness concerning environmental issues that are affecting our community as well as encouraging all residents to enjoy and take advantage of the environmental treasures that are all available here in Ridgefield Park," he said. "The Environmental Commission continues to tackle important issues and has introduced new programs and ideas that have and will continue to transform Ridgefield Park into a more sustainable community. This also includes the grand opening of the Ridgefield Park Nature Preserve, which we celebrated last June." Joining the celebration this year will be the Sea Turtle Recovery of West Orange. Returning interactive shows include Snakes N Scales, Mad Science, and the Tenafly Nature Center.

DON'T GET SCAMMED!

The saying goes "A sucker is born every minute". But, you don't have to be a sucker to get scammed. The con artists and scammers prey upon everyone from all walks of life - young or old; rich or poor. In the old days, the scam would usually be perpetrated in-person, by mail, or by a landline phone call. Today, it is done via the internet or on our cell phones. The typical con is that you get a call on your phone; and -if your cautious and look at the caller ID, the call looks legitimate. But, it's not. The scam artist can change his caller ID so it looks like some other number than his own. The number may even match a real telephone number of the bank or credit card company number. But,

Then they will give you a story that someone may have illegally used your bank account, credit card account, etc.; and they are checking with you to verify whether you had ordered a product, service, etc. And, at some point, they are going to ask you to send them money. They may ask you to go to a local store (such as CVS, Walgreens, 7-11, etc.) and purchase a cash card (MoneyPak, Vanilla Card, etc.). Then, they will explain that the funds will be refunded to you or will be sent to a charity; or that they will be sending you a product, etc.

Maybe they will convince you to go to your bank to withdraw the funds and send the money to them via some "secure" method. Once you send the money- in whatever process - the money is gone. Similarly, you may get a call from the IRS or the Social Security Administration; and they say that they need to verify your personal information (SS#, Date of Birth, etc), it probably is a scam. You may get a call from someone who says that you have to act quickly or make the payment as soon as possible. Ask for their number so that you can verify who you are talking to; or then talk to your local police department. You may get similar requests on your email; and the email may look legitimate; but it is not. When you have doubts, contact the sender through the contact information that you already have. Contact telephone numbers are on your bank statements, credit cards, etc. You may say to yourself that you are

smarter than the victims of these scams. Maybe you are. But, there are so many smart and sophisticated people who have fallen for these con artists.

Don't allow yourself to be scammed. There was an old Television show entitled "RACKET SQUAD" from the 1950s which provided re-creations of real scams, frauds and con games. At the end of the program,

the host would always say the following: "Remember, there are people who can slap you on the back with one hand, and pick your pocket with the other. And, it can happen to you."

If they want you to send them money, JUST TERMINATE THE CALL.

The Social Security Administration has taken the initiative to warn the public about these types of scams: Slam the Scam. Fundraising Update

The Ridgefield Park Police Department and PBA Local 86 would like to extend our gratitude to all Village residents and businesses who generously donated to our annual fund drive mailing. Please be reminded that the PBA Local 86 is the only organization connected to our department. We absolutely do not solicit donations by telephone under any circumstances. Any requests for donations from any other police organizations should be carefully scrutinized. Please contact police headquarters at (201) 641-6400 if you have any questions or uncertainties.

Fraud Alerts

Tax season is upon us and many Village residents have received fraudulent phone calls from individuals claiming to work with the Internal Revenue Service. We would like to remind residents to be cautious when dealing with individuals soliciting private information via the telephone or internet. If you are unsure if the call is legitimate, ask for a contact name and information and inform the caller that you will be in touch with them at a later date and time.

Tax-related scams are extremely popular and are often recognized well after the fact. Remember — if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. If you know of a tax fraud, you can report it to the IRS by sending completed Form 3949-A, Information Referral, which can be found on IRS.gov. Information on how to submit the completed form can also be found in the instructions portion of the form.

Phishing phone calls are also very common and may include actors pretending to call from a collection agency, telling you that you owe an outstanding balance, asking to settle a debt via credit card or gift cards over the phone, and threatening legal action or arrest. While it is hard to investigate phone scams, you can report them to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). They will track complaints from consumers that will help detect patterns of fraud or abuse. Visit https://reportfraud.ftc.gov/ and click on the "Report Now" tab, in the top right corner, to report a scam.



Spring is upon us and we would like to remind all residents that yard waste pick up will begin again on Monday, March 18th. Yard waste MUST BE placed in a garbage can or in brown garden bags in order to be picked up. NO plastic bags will be accepted. NO waste is to be put into the streets or plazas. If you place debris in the street, you may be subjected to a fine. Leaf season will begin again in October.

We will be hosting a FREE paper shredding and hard plastics recycling day on Saturday, April 6th at 24 Industrial Avenue from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

We would like to advise all residents that if you have a sewer issue in your home and if a plumber says it is a Village issue, please call the DPW while the plumber is onsite. If it is after hours or on a weekend, please call the non-emergency number for the police and they will contact us. The homeowner is responsible for any piping from the house to the main connection.

SHADE TREE COMMISION

With sadness, the Shade Tree Commission commemorates George Gosen, an important and long time member, who passed away December 10, 2023. George tirelessly volunteered in Ridgefield Park organizations over 50 years: a founding member of the RP Coop Nursery School; a Trustee/treasurer for the RP Library Board; and Vice-chairperson for the STC. As a STC member, in addition to regular activities, he started the Sidewalk Safety Program whereby the Village pays to repair sidewalks damaged by Village trees. His work included doing sidewalk inspections, hiring and supervising private contractors to repair and replace sidewalks; and submitting bills for reimbursement. The STC appreciates George's hard work and professionalism; his friendly, funny, warm personality; and very importantly, his DELICIOUS food.

Private donations from family and friends in memory of George (to date, about \$4500) will be used to plant a grove of trees in the area above the High School track. The dedication ceremony will take place on ARBOR DAY on Saturday, April 27th at 9:30am. ALL ARE WELCOME.

Featured Tree

The swamp white oak, Quercus bicolor, is spotlighted this issue. A large, single trunk tree reaching 60 feet or more at maturity with a rounded crown about as wide as the tree is tall provides shade and plenty of acorns for a variety of birds and mammals to enjoy. Although needing space, it is very tolerant of urban conditions. The tree has large leaves, green on top and lighter color below, which turn yellow or orange-gold in the fall.

Trees, Trees and Hopefully More Trees! The STC has chosen many beautiful trees to be planted by the DPW along the Village streets and in the parks but also urges property owners to plant trees in their yards because of the many benefits of trees for people and the environment. According to an excellent article on the American Forests website, trees lower utility bills by shading the house in the summer and allowing the sun to warm it in the winter; trees clean the air and absorb storm water runoff; trees block out traffic noise; and trees help fight climate change. VILLAGE WILL RECEIVE \$20,000,000 FROM COUNTY OF BERGEN

As reported in the last Newsletter, the Village of Ridgefield Park will receive \$20 million from the County of Bergen. This sum represents a years long negotiation by the Commissioners with the County of Bgergen to settle a long pending lawsuit involving the County's obligation to build a pedestrian bridge from the Ridgefield Park High School over Interstate Route I-95 to the Overpeck County Park.

This settlement will fund the complete renovation of Veterans Park which includes eleven (11) fields, playgrounds, and other amenities of approximately 29 acres of Village property. The \$20 million settlement is not a loan, but rather a payment made in five installments from the County, to be used to upgrfade long-needed renovations to Veterans Park.
