CHANGE IN NEWSPAPER AND MAGAZINE CURBSIDE PICKUP

As most of us know, we do not subscribe to, nor purchase, newspapers or magazines like we did in the past. Compared to 10 years ago there has been a 70% drop in the amount of newspapers and magazines collected. The drop in the last 20 years has been 80%.

Beginning January 2022 the DPW will change to curbside pickup of newspapers and magazines just ONCE A MONTH. You can still bring your newspapers and magazines to the recycling center any time it is open. Recycling center is located at 24 Industrial Avenue and is open from 9:00am until noon Monday through Saturday.

North of Mt. Vernon -Last Thursday of the month. January 27th. South of Mt. Vernon -Last Friday of the month. January 28th.

NEW POLLINATOR GARDEN AT HIGH SCHOOL HAS VILLAGE BUZZING

There's certainly a buzz in the air at Ridgefield Park Junior-Senior High School. Perhaps it is the new addition of a pollinator garden at the school that has everyone buzzing. Gianna Terrarosa - a Girl Scout senior from Troop 95252 who led the project - says. "Pollinator gardens are gardens made specifically to help, well, pollinators. Bees, butterflies, hummingbirds - you name it, they like it." Located just north of the high school, the garden consists of mostly native plants meaning those that are indigenous to our region of the United States. Native plants help out pollinators by providing them with a source of food - something plants that are non-native can't offer. Non-native plants are those that are added into an environment where they aren't originally from. This is harmful to both the ecosystem and the animals that live in it, as the non-native plants can take away the resources they need to survive. In order to get the pollinator garden started, Gianna first had to obtain approval from the school's administration. Once that was done, she acquired building materials from Home Depot. Ridgefield Park's DPW had dug out the ground for her, and a landscaping company filled it with dirt. After making the ground level, it was time to plant.

"The flowers came from all over, really. They included species like swamp milkweed, wild bergamot, and joe-pye weed," says Gianna. "So many people pitched in and were willing to contribute. The Bergen County Audubon, This & That Hardware, and especially Linda Quinn, my project advisor, to name a few." Once the plants were in the ground, the DPW stepped in again and covered the garden with mulch. "Since the plants are native, maintenance isn't such a big deal," Gianna reports. "They're meant to be here. They need water for the first couple of weeks to get established, but after that they do just fine without much human interference." Gianna is planting this garden not only for the good of the environment - she's also doing it for her Gold Award. "Basically, a Gold Award is the equivalent of earning an Eagle Scout Award," Gianna explains. "It's the highest award a Girl Scout can earn. You have to put 80 hours of time into a project that will really help and change your community for the better, and last even after you're gone."

Why did she pick this specific project? "I've always loved the environment. We tend to overlook the fact that nature is a living, breathing thing that needs to be taken care of. Pollinators are in trouble because of human development. We take up a lot of space - and the more we take, the less the bees and butterflies of the world have. My pollinator garden is giving these creatures a safe space. Nature gives us so much, so it's only right we give it something back. That's why I've titled my project 'Just One Plant'. My goal is striving for everyone in Ridgefield Park to plant just one native plant. That's all that's really necessary to help out the pollinators." Every Gold Award Girl Scout works with a "project advisor" - someone who is an expert on the topic. Their job is to give advice and guidance throughout the process. "My project advisor is Linda Quinn. She, her husband Steve Quinn, and the Ridgefield Park Environmental Commission have helped me so much over the past six months. There's no way I could have done this project without them." "This is such a huge undertaking for a student who truly cares about the environment," said Mayor John Anlian. "The pollinator garden that Gianna has created will help support and maintain pollinators by supplying them with food in the form of pollen and nectar.



This ensures that these important animals will stay in our area to keep pollinating our crops for continued fruit and vegetable production. I might add that the pollinator garden is strategically placed near the site of the Village's Nature Preserve where we will be building a boardwalk and nature trail which we expect to be completed by next spring."

As far as future plans for the garden, Gianna says she has to focus on longevity. "I'm going to be doing a small educational program for younger Girl Scouts at the garden. I'll be teaching them the importance of planting native plants, and doing all they can to help out the pollinators. Also, once the garden really starts thriving, I'd like to give plants to the library, the elementary schools, and other public areas throughout Ridgefield Park.

When school begins, I hope to become an active member of the Green Team. Hopefully, students who are willing to take care of the garden after I graduate will join the organization with me. Since all of the plants are perennials, with the exception of one, they'd only have to do some basic maintenance. Then, who knows? I'd love to see the garden last for a long, long time." RIDGEFIELD PARK ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION NATURE PRESERVE - NATURE TRAIL

Construction has already begun on a nature trail and boardwalk in the

Ridgefield Park Nature Preserve which is located on approximately 13 acres of undisturbed land just north and adjacent to the Ridgefield Park Junior Senior High School.

The trail and boardwalk will cover just under one mile and traverse natural habitats of woodland, freshwater marsh, and open field. When completed, the trail will feature exhibit panels and displays that highlight the many plants and animals that live in the preserve and discuss its ecological importance to the community of Ridgefield Park. Special plantings will attract butterflies and pollinators, and feeding stations will attract the preserves many types of birds for easy observation. The Nature Preserve will provide many opportunities for special educational programs for the Ridgefield Park school system, especially the nearby Junior Senior High School, and also be available to Village scouting and civic organizations for programming. Most importantly, it will be available to ALL Village residents for taking a peaceful and relaxing stroll in nature!

Though not open to the public yet, we hope the trail and boardwalk will be completed by the spring of 2022, at which time we will be commencing a restoration of the native habitat.

RAFFLES

All Clubs, Organizations, PTAs or Individuals that conduct 50/50's, tricky trays, basket raffles, bingo, casino nights, or any other type of raffle must register with the State of New Jersey Legalized Games of Chance Commission to obtain an Identification Number. Only after obtaining this ID number can you apply for a raffle license.

The State will not issue a raffle license unless you are a registered organization. To register: www.njconsumeraffairs.gov/lgccc

Failure to comply can result in your event being shut down.

Raffle license applications are available in the Village Clerk's office. Applications must be completed six (6) weeks prior to your raffle.

THE BUREAU OF FIRE PREVENTION

This year Fire Prevention Week is October 3rd through October 9th. This year's theme is Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety. According to the latest NFPA "Smoke Alarms in the U.S." report, working smoke alarms in the home reduce the risk of dying in a reported fire by more than half. However, almost three out of five home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarm or smoke alarms that failed to operate.

" When a smoke alarm or carbon monoxide (CO) alarm sounds, respond immediately by exiting the home as quickly as possible.

* If your alarm begins to chirp, it may mean that the batteries are running low and need to be replaced. If the alarm continues to chirp after the batteries are replaced, or the alarm is more than 10 years old, it is time to replace the alarm.

* Test all smoke and CO alarms monthly. Press the test button to make sure the alarm is working.

* If there is someone in your household who is deaf or hard of hearing, install a bed shaker and strobe light alarms that will alert that person to fire.

* Know the difference between the sound of a smoke alarm and a carbon monoxide alarm - three beeps for smoke alarms; four beeps for carbon monoxide alarms.

THE HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

was formed in November 1996 by the Mayor and Board of Commissioners. The HPC consists of five regular members and two alternate members appointed by the Board of Commissioners. The mission of the HPC is to review and oversee changes in the architectural appearance of buildings within the Village's Central Business District; and to assure that the appearances of these structures, and the district as a whole, is preserved and enhanced.

The Village's Central Business District is roughly along Main Street from Summit Street to the Post Office at Pine Street and along Mount Vernon Street from Herbert Street to near Bergen Avenue. Some side street sections, such as along Spruce Street are also within the district.

The buildings and architectural appearance of our business district possesses a certain character upon which the HPC would like to preserve and improve. Architectural Guidelines have been prepared for reference when properties or businesses decide to make changes affecting the facades of the buildings in the district. The commission reviews applications for all proposed changes within the district using these established Guidelines.

Anyone who is altering, renovating, or otherwise changing the exterior of a building or property within the district must apply before the Historic Preservation Commission. Work may include, but not be limited to, signs, awnings, lights, storefronts, sidewalks and painting. It is incumbent upon all property owners within the district to advise potential tenants that they must apply for approval from the Commission for any changes to the exterior of the building, including the space immediately inside a glass storefront. It should also be noted that, where building exteriors are deteriorating or are in need of maintenance, approvals may be granted contingent upon the building owner making necessary improvements.

The HPC meets on the fourth Thursday of the month at 6:00 p.m. at the municipal building. The HPC is looking for interested residents or business owners who would like to serve on the HPC. If interested, please email the HPC at:

GREEN TEAM NEWS

The Green Team has been busy. We met our second deadline for submitting Sustainable Jersey actions. Currently, we are one of 8 communities in Bergen County to have earned silver certification.

At the end of September, the Green Team hosted our first Green Fair held independently from Earth Day and the Environmental Commission. The premise was to recycle/reuse/re-purpose items that many might have discarded into the trash. The Green Team had educational tables set up to suggest ways to "green" our own homes from simple swaps to major ones. One example is using an old tshirt as a cleaning cloth. The t-shirt rag gets washed and dried to be clean to use again while the wipes and paper towels get thrown out. Swap participants donated clothing and accessories to the event and were able to choose items new to them donated by others. A re-use section was also set up for household items, similar to what we have at the DPW recycle center. We had food vendors and tables set up so visitors and vendors could select from a varied menu. In keeping with the "greening" theme, only compostable and recyclable products were used for serving meals and snacks.

We have had several citizens inquire about joining our Green Team. Anyone wishing more information or meeting us are welcome to attend a meeting. Our meetings are in the Municipal Building Court Room on the 4th Thursday of each month (unless otherwise noted) starting at 7pm. School is Open, DRIVE CAREFULLY With Ridgefield Park Schools scheduled to open on September 9, we ask that all motorists be cautious with children attempting to get to school. Every fall, over 55 million children across the United States head back to school. With 13 percent of those children typically walking or biking to their classes, AAA warns drivers to be especially vigilant for pedestrians before and after school hours. The afternoon hours are particularly dangerous - over the last decade, nearly one in four child pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. Slow down: Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling just 10 mph faster.

Come to a complete stop: Research shows that more than one-third of drivers roll through stop signs in school zones or neighborhoods. Always come to a complete stop, checking carefully for children on sidewalks and in crosswalks before proceeding. **Eliminate distractions:** Research shows that taking your eyes off the road for just two seconds doubles your chances of crashing. Children can be quick, crossing the road unexpectedly or emerging suddenly between two parked vehicles. Reduce risk by not using your cell phone or eating while driving, for example.

Reverse responsibly: Every vehicle has blind spots. Check for children on the sidewalk, in the driveway and around your vehicle before slowly backing. Please do not rely solely on a vehicle's back-up camera.

R.P. SENIOR ACTIVITY CENTER

Due to pandemic restrictions, we are currently operating with 3 daily sessions Monday - Friday except holidays. Our morning sessions are from 9am-11am, we have a pick up lunch program with a suggested donation of \$1.25 from 11:15-12:15 and an afternoon session from 12:30-3pm. We are required to clean in between sessions and seniors must exit the facility during cleaning times.

SAVE THE VILLAGE TREE

The New York Times published an article "Trees Save Lives. Yet Cities aren't Saving Trees" which focused on the loss of tens of millions of US trees a year and the resulting negative impact on lives.

How true and how unfortunate that even in Ridgefield Park which has been a Tree City since 1980, there has been significant loss of healthy shade trees on private property; numerous large backyard trees, even one of the oldest and largest American Elms in NJ plus 14 magnificent scarlet maples, chosen to beautify the Ridgefield Park Junior-Senior High School campus, home of the Scarlets, are among the trees recently removed.

Although RP does not require a permit to remove trees on private property, as many towns do, the Shade Tree Commission urges property owners to keep, not remove healthy trees. Certainly if a tree is dead, dying or diseased and is a hazard to safety and property, it should come down...and then, hopefully, replaced. Concerned about a tree...have an arborist or STC member look at the tree.

The STC, DPW, and Commissioners work together to plant and care for trees because they are important to the residents in so many ways.

Please consider the positive impact each tree has before removing a healthy tree: Provides shade-lowers temperature 10 degrees in towns and cities Filters air pollutants Lowers energy use-less summer AC Reduces urban island effect(heat from concrete and asphalt coverage) Manages stormwater runoff (flooding in communities after rain) Reduces noise pollution Provides habitat for wildlife Note: Above information has been compiled from the NYT newspaper, Hackensack Times, a Hackensack Riverkeeper publication, and Arbor Day, an Arbor Day Foundation publication Homeowner Information

* The public right-of-way extends several feet inside the sidewalks on most streets in RP. Trees within the right-of-way, either in the planting strip between street and sidewalk or inside the sidewalk, are owned by the Village of RP. Village trees are under the care and supervision of the RPSTC under ordinance 3-79.

* Bushes and trees may not be planted in the public right-of-way without the approval of the STC. Plantings in the public right-of-way become the property of the Village. Planting strips can have grass, mulch, ground covers, herbaceous plants or even loose stones permitting water to penetrate. Planting strips may not be covered in cement, blocks, asphalt or wood preventing rain fro soaking into the ground around the tree sites.

* Tree branches and tree roots on Village trees may not be cut without the approval of the STC. Property owners may not remove Village trees.

* Any construction, curbing, paving, or laying of sidewalks that might interfere or damage a Village tree, must have the consent of the STC. Written notice must be given at least ten working days ahead of time to permit inspection of the site. * Nothing can be stapled or nailed to a Village tree. * STC meetings are held in the lower level of the Civic Center on the fourth Monday of the month, except for December when meeting is the second Monday.
