RAFFLES

All Clubs, Organizations, PTAs or Individuals that conduct 50/50's, tricky trays, basket raffles, bingo, casino nights, or any other type of raffle must register with the State of New Jersey Legalized Games of Chance Commission to obtain an Identification Number. Only after obtaining this ID number can you apply for a raffle license.

The State will not issue a raffle license unless you are a registered organization. To register: www.njconsumeraffairs.gov/lgccc

Failure to comply can result in your event being shut down.

Raffle license applications are available in the Village Clerk's office. Applications must be completed six (6) weeks prior to your raffle.

PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS

Property Tax Payments can now be made online using a debit/credit card, or your bank account information. There will be convenience fees charged for this service. WEBSITE

COMMUNITY GARDEN NEWS

Our community garden continues to grow during year 2. This year we established public beds which have trellis backs along the perimeters of each garden. The trellis allows the public plots to be easily identified and not confused with the plots for the private use of our gardeners. These new public plots are maintained by our gardeners.

As our crops from the public beds become ready to pick, we have been sharing them with concert goers, moms at the park and those who are just admiring our gardens. Please remember that the plots in the center of each garden are for private use and should not be picked from.

We now have water at the McGowan Community Garden. This will make it much more efficient to maintain the garden. On August 9th, we had a small reception at the McGowan Community Garden to acknowledge the arrival of the stone which will be carved on site to create our first piece of public art. It will eventual-

ly be placed in the middle of McGowan Community Garden. Attending the event was former village resident Sung Ho Choi, the artist who created the design, Ridgefield Park resident George Cooke, the artist who is carving the sculpture, Commissioners Anlian, MacNeill and Poli, plus several gardeners and village residents. The sculpture will be known as Aeon after completion.

Feel free to stop by McGowan to watch George as he carves and maybe ask him to explain the process. We started a guest book which we hope you will sign as you watch this piece of stone become a piece of art.

Following this event, several people interested in promoting the creative arts in the village, spent the remainder of the evening at Art Mora, the art gallery on Main Street owned by Sunny Shin. SHADE TREE COMMISSION AUGUST 2018

Do you know what the New Jersey state tree is? It's the red oak, or Quercus rubra, and was officially named the state tree June 13, 1950. The species is planted throughout the Village and stands out in the fall with a spectacular deep red and orange foliage. Look for them

The red oak as well as all the trees are valuable Village assets and to assist in their ongoing care, the Shade Tree Commission completed a survey of trees on public property along Village streets. There are 3420 trees in the right of way and information in the tree files includes species, size, and condition of each tree. The files are constantly updated with information such as tree removals, tree planting, pruning, and inspection reports. This database of trees and their health will help to provide proper maintenance and care.

For maintenance and care, the STC utilizes the services of New Jersey Certified

Arborists for evaluating Village trees. The DPW handles removal of trees listed for removal by the STC based on the arborists' recommendations. DPW also handles emergency pruning. Professional tree care companies with Certified Tree Experts do pruning based on the Arborists' recommendations.

Property owners also need to know the Village ordinances that protect the trees.

The Shade Tree Commission may require the treatment or removal of a tree on private property deemed hazardous to public safety or a danger to neighboring property or trees, at the homeowner's expense.

The public right-of-way extends several feet inside the sidewalks on most streets in Ridgefield Park. Trees within the right-of-way, either in the planting strip between street and sidewalk or inside the sidewalk, are property of the Village of Ridgefield Park. Village trees are under the care and supervision of the STC. All pruning and maintenance of trees on public property is handled by the STC. Property owners may NOT prune Village trees either inside or outside the sidewalk.

Bushes and trees may not be planted in the public right-of-way without the approval of the STC. Plantings in the public rightof-way become the property of the Village. NOTHING may be stapled or nailed or screwed to a tree.

Homeowners may NOT remove or damage Village trees. Any construction, curbing, paving, or laying of sidewalks and/or driveways that might interfere with or damage a Village tree, must have the consent of the STC. Written notice must be given at least 10 working days ahead to permit time for the arborist to examine the site and give recommendations. Tree roots of Village trees may NOT be cut for sidewalks or other construction without the approval of the STC. Any cutting must be done by a qualified arborist.

Planting strips can have grass, mulch, ground covers, herbaceous plants, or even loose stones permitting water to penetrate. Planting strips may NOT be covered in cement or asphalt preventing rain from soaking into the ground around tree sites.

If there is a concern about a Village tree, contact the STC either by letter addressed to 234 Main Street; phone 201-641-4950, extension 640; or by attending a meeting. Always provide your name, phone number, and concern along with the address of the tree site. You will be contacted after a STC meeting, the STC meets on the second and

fourth Mondays at 7:30 pm in the third floor conference room.

SIDEWALKS

The STC has the Sidewalk Safety Program for sidewalks that need lifting or replacing due to Village shade tree roots. Anyone interested in the program should obtain forms at Town Hall and return the completed forms to the STC to initiate inspection.

Currently, there is a waiting list, but submit your application now because work is done according to the date the application is received.

All reimbursable work MUST BE PREAPPROVED BY A STC MEMBER and done by a STC APPROVED CONTRACTOR. Property owners will not be reimbursed for work done without preapproval by STC or by a contractor who is not STC approved. Property owners are required to pay the contractor and then submit the invoice to the STC for reimbursement

Join STC and help to keep the Village lovely and green.

GRASSCYCLING

Did you know that grass clippings have a lot of nutrients that add to the soil organic matter and supply part of the fertilizer needs of your lawn? They do.

Getting Started

Instead of bagging those grass clippings, why not recycle them on your lawn by using either a mulching lawn mower or getting a mulching blade for your lawn mower? It's a lot less work.

If you use a lawn service, they may already mulch for you, and if they don't you can ask them about making it a part of the service you receive.

Helpful Tips

- 1) Implement a mowing schedule to keep the lawn short which should filter through the grass that is growing and not create a mat on top of the lawn.
- 2) Lawn grasses need roughly 1 inch of water per week through the growing season. Fertilizing and watering beyond the requirements of the grass may not be beneficial to your lawn. The result can be increased production of grass clipping and potential ground or surface water pollution.
- 3) Cut the grass higher during hot spells. It shades the soil and taller grass has longer roots.

4) Use sprinklers in the early morning when there's less wind to blow the water and less sunlight to evaporate it. Morning watering also discourages pests and disease by giving the lawn the rest of the day to dry.

Summary

Waste reduction is just as important as recycling. You help when you reduce waste created by grass clippings, which can be as much as 1/3 of the waste generated in towns and municipalities.

If you must dispose of your grass clippings, do not throw them in the garbage. Check the 2018 recycling and garbage collection calendar for collection in your part of town on the Ridgefield Park website at: https://www.ridgefieldpark.org/department-public-works/files/dpw-collection-schedule-july-dec-2018

Remember, grass clippings also can be used in a compost pile. The additional nitrogen grass clippings supply will help speed up the microbial process. However, large amounts of fresh clippings, all at one time, can create odor problems, so it is best to let the grass clippings dry out for a couple of days before composting.

Non-Owner Occupied Dwellings

The New Jersey Uniform Fire Safety Act (N.J.S.A.52:27d-192 et seg) places all nonowner occupied one and two family dwellings, under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Fire Prevention to enforce the provisions of the State Fire Code to provide a reasonable degree of safety from fire. Failure to comply with this State Law will result in Administrative penalties, collectable through the State Superior Court.

WINTER BIRD COUNT SCHEDULED FOR DEC. 8

Ridgefield Park bird lovers be sure to circle Saturday, December 8 on your calendar for the Ridgefield Park Environmental Commission's 2018 Annual Winter Bird Count.

All residents of the Village are invited to participate in the event. There will be two meet-up locations: The starting point will be at 7:00 a.m. at McGowan Park, followed by the Amphitheater at Overpeck Park at 9:30 a.m.

Participants are encouraged to bring a pair of binoculars with them and to wear hiking boots and appropriate clothing for winter weather conditions. The bird count will be cancelled in the event of rain or snow.

ATTRACTING WILD BIRDS TO YOUR BACKYARD IN WINTER

There is nothing more beautiful than the sights and sounds of Cardinals, Blue jays and Chickadees feeding in the snow outside your window and the wild birds in your neighborhood will especially benefit from your providing food for them in winter.

Here are a few helpful hints on how to attract and care for our feathered friends when the weather gets cold.

The types of food you offer will attract different birds. Black oil Sunflower seed is probably the best as it attracts Cardinals, Blue jays, chickadees, nuthatches, and finches. Safflower seed is irresistible for Cardinals. Thistle seed is best for attracting Goldfinches. Peanuts are best for Blue Jays. Millet and cracked corn is good for doves, Juncos and sparrows, but be advised, it can also attract pigeons, so use it sparingly. Suet or suet cakes are another food that help sustain wild birds during cold winters. It is especially good for attracting woodpeckers, chickadees, and nuthatches.

And there are many types of bird feeders to choose from. Hopper feeders are good as they can be filled with a longer lasting supply of seed. Tube feeders are great for serving thistle seed to Goldfinches. Window feeders equipped with suction cups are great for kids as it allows them to get close-up views of the birds. And suet feeders, made of wire, are made for serving up beef fat or suet cakes for woodpeckers.

And, of course, all the above bird seed attracts squirrels! Unless you enjoy watching the antics of squirrels helping themselves to your feeders, there are a few feeders and feeding stations that are especially designed to discourage them. There are even feeders especially designed for squirrels — if you enjoy feeding them! The best sources for these and all supplies related to bird feeding is at Wild Birds Unlimited on Route 17 in Paramus or the National Wildlife Federation's online store. Most hardware stores and supermarkets are also good supply sources.

In future editions of the Village Newsletter we will share how you can attract butterflies and hummingbirds to your backyard in the summer!

SHOP/DINE AT LOCAL ESTABLISHMENTS

WHAT TO DO WITH ALL THOSE AUTUMN LEAVES!

The longer you garden, the greater your appreciation for the value of organic matter. And one of the very best sources of organic matter is autumn leaves.

Leaves are packed with trace minerals that trees draw up from deep in the soil. When added to your garden, leaves feed earthworms and beneficial microbes. They lighten heavy soils and help sandy soils retain moisture. They make an attractive mulch in the flower garden. You can Use them to insulate tender perennial plants from the winter cold.

Here's how to put leaves to work in your garden. Let the leaves pile up on your lawn and then drive over them a few times with the lawn mower. Rake them up and then use them as mulch in your perennial or vegetable gardens. In time, they will break down and do wonders for your soil. Your soil will be teeming with earthworms and other beneficial organisms by spring. Soil with good organic content like shredded leaves is high in calcium and magnesium and retains three to five times its weight in water - rivaling peat moss. If you compost, add them to your compost bin with grass clippings and once they are composted, use them as mulch in your garden beds all summer long!

THE MAKING OF A SCULPTURE

Next time you find yourself near McGowan Park on Bergen Turnpike, you owe it to yourself to stop by to witness the birth of a sculpture.

On August 9th a limestone block weighing 3,350 pounds and standing 56" tall completed its journey from a limestone quarry in Indiana. After being cut to size and delivered by Generation Stone Works of McKeesport Pennsylvania, which is just outside of Pittsburgh, it was set in place on a temporary platform in McGowan Park by the Department of Public Works.

Over the next several months, Ridgefield Park resident and artist George Cooke, who already has a few smaller art pieces on display at McGowan Park, will be carving the stone with elegant precision at the park. Upon its completion, the sculpture will be called Aeon. Designed by Sung Ho Choi, a former Ridgefield Park resident. Aeon contains 10 Korean symbols of long life.

Come see and experience this splendid

Once completed, Aeon will be placed in the center of the Community Garden location in McGowan Park for all to enjoy while visiting the park. Continue to check the Green Team's website for information on when Aeon will be dedicated.

This needs to be done before anyone participates in a sports program. If you plan on participating in a sport in the future, please be sure to complete this free on-line course at your convenience. You must forward your certificate of completion to the Board of Recreation before you will be permitted to participate in any sports program.

New Jersey law is requiring that all organizations who use the Board of Education facilities comply with this program. RESIDENT REMINDERS

Taxicabs and Limousines

No vehicle with taxi or limousine license plates from any state and no vehicle for hire used for the purpose of the transportation of passengers shall be parked on any day of the week on any street within the Village of Ridgefield Park between the hours of 10:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. (Village Ordinance 351-5.1)

School is Open, DRIVE CAREFULLY

Every fall, over 55 million children across the United States head back to school. With 13 percent of those children typically walking or biking to their classes, AAA warns drivers to be especially vigilant for pedestrians before and after school hours. The afternoon hours are particularly dangerous — over the last decade, nearly one in four child pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m.

Slow down: Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling just 10 mph faster.

Come to a complete stop: Research shows that more than one-third of drivers roll through stop signs in school zones or neighborhoods. Always come to a complete stop, checking carefully for children on sidewalks and in crosswalks before proceeding.

Eliminate distractions: Research shows that taking your eyes off the road for just two seconds doubles your chances of crashing. Children can be quick, crossing the road unexpectedly or emerging suddenly between two parked cars. Reduce risk by not using your cell phone or eating while driving, for example.

Reverse responsibly: Every vehicle has blind spots. Check for children on the sidewalk, in the driveway and around your vehicle before slowly backing up. Teach your children to never play in, under or around vehicles.

Pedestrian Safety (39:4-36)

NJSA 39:4-36 states that a driver must stop and yield to pedestrians that are in a marked or unmarked crosswalk where two streets intersect or when turning at an intersection that is controlled by a traffic light. Failure to observe the law may subject you to:

- 2 points on your license
- \$200.00 fine plus court costs
- 15 days of community service

Just as big a problem as motorists who fail to yield to pedestrians in a crosswalk are pedestrians who walk out into the street and expect a motor vehicle, in transit, to suddenly come to a complete stop. This is unrealistic and very dangerous. Pedestrians are expected to utilize crosswalks while crossing the street so that they may be seen by drivers more easily and to look both ways for approaching vehicles before crossing the street. NO PEDESTRIANS should be texting or talking on their cell phones while crossing the street. Juveniles and adults alike should also wear reflective clothing while walking or riding bicycles at night when poor visibility becomes a bigger factor.



Stay Back 50 Feet!

Slow down and look for workers before you go around any truck.





NJ Legislation has passed a bill (A-4452), effective May 1, 2017, which adds SANITATION VEHICLES to the existing "Slow Down/Move Over" law. The bill, referred to as "Michael Massey's Law", follows the death of Freehold resident Michael Massey, an Ocean County public works employee who was killed in a 2013 motor vehicle crash while working.

The law REQUIRES motorists to reduce their speed and change lanes when approaching authorized vehicles-which now includes sanitation vehicles. The law also requires sanitation vehicles to display flashing amber lights while stopped on a street and while engaged in the collection of garbage or while moving between stops at a speed of 10 miles per hour or less.



COLLECTION REGULATION REMINDER

Newspapers and Comingled recyclables can no longer be placed in PLASTIC BAGS!

All containers and recyclables must be placed at the curb NO EARLIER than 5 PM. the night before collection and empty containers removed from the curb by 8 PM on collection day.

GARBAGE RECEPTACLES:



Garbage and recycling receptacles are susceptible to rodents and insects. Please keep garbage in a covered receptacle. Rinsing them with water and bleach will help to keep them clean and detract pests.

Oversized receptacles will be tagged. Repeated use of oversized cans will result in confiscation of receptacle.

All trash containers must be 32 gallons or less!

- The contents must be lifted by one person.
- DO NOT purchase the extra-large trash containers that are made for machinery to lift. These include wheeled containers with a bar instead of handles and flip back tops. They cannot be emptied by one person safely.
- Bags cannot weigh more than 30 lbs.
- Do NOT fill your garbage can with rocks or dirt. Do not allow it to fill with water.
- Yard waste limit is 35 pounds per container.

Broken receptacles and those that do not meet regulations may be classified as trash and collected for disposal

LEAF SEASON



LEAF SEASON begins on October 14th and ends on December 30th. Leaves must be placed in the street-along the curb line in front of your home on the alternate side parking day, when the sweeper is due to pass. It is a violation of Village of Ridgefield Park ordinance to sweep, cast or throw anything into the gutter except leaves during designated leaf season. Leaves can also be placed in a trash can or PAPER bags.

PAPER SHREDDING

• The DPW will once again hold a paper shredding day on Saturday, October 27, 2018 at 24 Industrial Avenue from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. This FREE event will provide residents and businesses the opportunity to have their sensitive documents safely shredded and recycled. POT HOLES:

RAIN WATER:



Catch basins are designed to slow the release of the rain water into the storm sewer system. Debris collects on top of the catch basin, preventing it from entering the system while also slowing the draining process. DPW crews clear this debris after heavy rainfalls. Report excessive accumulation of debris to the DPW. It is unlawful to put anything into the catch basin. This includes motor oil, cooking oil, pet waste or other debris.

RECYCLING CENTER

The recycling center is located at 24 Industrial Avenue.

Residents can drop off recyclable items from 9 AM to 12PM (NOON), Monday through Saturday. A "REUSE" area is now available. Residents can leave serviceable items they no longer need, which may be of use to other residents. This is at the discretion of the recycling coordinator and limited to space constraints.

Only small amounts of trash will be accepted and proof of residency is required.

You may be required to show a valid building permit for construction materials.

SCAVENGERS:



Scavenging is against the law. Village ordinance prohibits the removal of any curbside trash/recyclables by anyone other than a DPW employee or agent. The village receives revenue from some collections, which helps to offset disposal and equipment costs. Call the Police Department @ 201-641-6400, if you notice scavengers in your area.

STREET SWEEPING



The street sweeper is scheduled to clean in front of your home once each week, weather permitting. If you check the half-day parking ban signs in front of your home, you will know when the street will be cleaned. Alternate Side Parking is in effect whether the sweeper is out or not, so please move your vehicle as noted.

WHITE GOODS



WHITE GOODS and tires <u>must be called into the DPW</u> before they are placed at the curb.

WHITE GOODS include: Tires, Computers, Electronics, TVs, and Air Conditioners & Appliances.

Note: Refrigerators and freezers must have doors removed & unit should be laid flat to prevent injury. Call 201-440-4860, give address, place item at the curb Tuesday night for Wednesday pick-up. Failure to call will result in the item remaining at the curb and you may be subject to a fine.

YARD WASTE:



Yard waste consists of grass clippings, garden vines, leaves tree branches, shrubbery. **Stones, gravel, rocks, dirt and sod will NOT be picked up.** Yard waste must be put into a container or
PAPER bag weighing no more than 35 lbs. <u>Do NOT rake yard waste into the street</u>. Tree
branches and brush should be cut into 4 ft. lengths and tied into manageable bundles. Place
yard waste on the curb the night before your collection day.
